We might envision, someday, our children's children taking their AI to church to initiate its thinking intelligence on the concept of God, Christ, and the Holy Spirit. We still must reach those who are beyond the influence of computers and AI with the good news of Christ.

How can we do this? We connect with people the old-fashioned way with personal interaction! We do this people to people, face to face, and with the connection only a human touch can make. The spirit touches the soul of each of us.

Some tech philosophers think that a crisis might occur if an AI's goals are not the same as that of humanity, causing robots to break through human barriers and take over the world. However, the Bible suggests a different end to the world, one where "every eye shall see Christ coming on the clouds." I like that glorious ending and new beginning. Amen!

IT'S TURKEY DAY, BUT WHY TURKEY

The truth is, that it has little to do with the Pilgrims and their first thanksgiving feast in 1621 with the Wampanoag Indians. According to Edward Winslow's first-hand account, "the Wampanoag leader, Massasoit, arrived with 90 men, and the two communities feasted together for three days. The feast included five deer, and local fowl", which possibly included ducks and geese, and maybe wild turkey. It almost certainly included squash, corn and shellfish, which were a staple of Native American diets.

Actually, historians have found that most 'modern' Thanksgiving traditions began in the mid-19th century, more than two centuries after the Pilgrims' first harvest celebration. Sarah Hale, author of "Mary Had a Little Lamb", was editor of Godey's Lady's Book in 1837. She and her colleagues began a crusade for the creation of an annual national holiday of "Thanksgiving and Praise" commemorating the Pilgrims' thanksgiving feast. They made an assumption that turkey was eaten at that feast because of the general belief of the abundance of wild turkey. The Godey's Lady's Book was filled with New England recipes and menus that featured turkey! It wasn't until 1863 before President Lincoln declared Thanksgiving a national holiday.

A roasted turkey makes a wonderful centerpiece for the table. This may have been influenced by Europe which had a tradition of serving large wildfowl, skinned, cooked, and re-sewn into its feathers for presentation and served with a tart jelly. Turkey gained popularity as a source of meat; it could serve a large crowd, and it was cheaper than a cow or a pig. Because a turkey did not provide milk or edible eggs, it made better sense to American homesteaders to slaughter it, instead of cattle or chickens.

Today, a roasted turkey remains America's Thanksgiving centerpiece, but the rest of our Thanksgiving table is still evolving. Maybe you like your turkey deep-fried, or maybe you like it smoked. There is no wrong way. The Pilgrims did not have mashed potatoes, bread stuffing, sugar, or green bean casserole. Yesterday's tart jelly is now cranberry sauce and the roasted squash is now pumpkin pie.

~ A little side fact ... each November, since 1947, the US president 'pardons' a turkey ... its life is spared and does not get eaten.

And the turkey says ... GOBBLE, GOBBLE!

November birthstone is the orange-yellow Topaz ... Symbolizes friendship.


The November flower is the chrysanthemum ... Symbolizes honesty, joy, and optimism.
