Dear Church Family,

Our church's largest mission for many years has been and continues to be the Presbyterian Child Center. As I was preparing the 2023 financial numbers for our church's annual statistical report for the Office of the General Assembly, I got an idea of how much the church spends supporting the PCC. The amounts are only rough estimates because there is no precise way of splitting things like utility costs between the church and the PCC. Also, I didn't even try to estimate the value of the building space itself—if the PCC were paying rent for the amount of space that it uses, its finances would be entirely different.

In 2023 the Mission Committee provided \$7,181 in direct support to the PCC. About \$2,100 of that paid for the Brightwheel childcare management software, which is essential for helping us run the center. Other support included providing holiday and teacher appreciation lunches and gift cards for the PCC staff. Other support from the church was indirect. In total the church provided about \$15,700 of indirect support that included part of the Christian education director's compensation, utility costs, and insurance costs. A conservative estimate is that the church provided a total of at least \$23,000 of support for the PCC in 2023.

Yet, even with the generous support of the church, the PCC has been losing money. In fact, if it had not received some very large grants from the state, we would have had to close the center. The reality is that the center has not yet recovered from the pandemic. Our enrollment is down, and we continue to have problems with staffing. We have trouble staffing our center with enough reliable employees to allow us to fill our rooms, even though we have increased their wages considerably.

Yet, those aren't the only changes that the pandemic left in its wake. We are beginning to realize that the needs of the community are changing. Other preschool options exist. One advantage of the PCC has been that we offer full-day care in addition to a preschool program. Now, part-day preschools are partnering with other providers to offer wrap-around care—in essence offering full-time care.

Currently, the biggest need in the community seems to be for children from eight weeks up to three years, that is, before they are potty trained. We are not yet at our capacity of 39 children in that age range because of staffing. When our staffing problems are resolved, we could fill those rooms quickly. We would like to expand our capacity for that age range, but only four rooms have diaper changing areas and sinks. The sinks are obviously the hard part because of the plumbing that is required. We are now looking into ways of adding at least one more room for children younger than three.

The changing needs of our community have me wondering where the mission focus of our church intersects with those needs. Many of our PCC families are facing challenges at home and are using a variety of social services. Do we have anything to offer those families? When we want to invite people to our church, inviting them to a worship service may not the best way to start. What could we invite people to come and do with us? Would hosting classes in the evening be helpful? I'm not sure where to begin, but I would like to be able to do more to share the love of Christ with our PCC families and respond to the changing needs of our community.
























MEET THE MACKS


