The Grace of doing something in the Kingdom of Heaven!

"I am only one, but I am one. I cannot do everything, but I can do something. And because I cannot do everything, I will not refuse to do the something that I can do."

— Edward Everett Hale (1822-1909), American author, historian, Unitarian minister

The grace of doing just something, is powerful.

In the parable of the mustard seed, Jesus reminds us that the kingdom, which has already begun with Christ, does not come with a glorious bang. Rather, it comes unexpectedly, almost unnoticed.

The mustard seed is but a little spec of a seed. Jesus said "it is the smallest of seeds." Sometimes we Christians forget the image of the mustard seed, and the encouragement it brings.

The mustard seed tells of a kingdom that starts very small, and grows large.

Mustard is an invasive weed, and Jesus refers to the way mustard works as examples of the way the kingdom of heaven works.

It may have begun from humble origins, but it is growing into something that cannot be contained. It may be hidden at the beginning, but it is unstoppable, pervasive, and abundant. Once a mustard plant takes hold, it spreads everywhere.

We look at huge, successful ministries and discount the importance of our local churches. We see a few Christians who impact thousands of people and figure that our contribution doesn't count. Our efforts are too tiny!

We try to live our faith in our workplace, but we don't see any major change in our jobs or our colleagues. When we retire, we may begin to sense that the winter of our life doesn't matter anymore. We go to school and get lost in the crowd. We sense in whatever facet of life we are living, if we aren't making noise, we are like that little mustard seed that doesn't matter.

However, God has chosen to use who we are, and what we have, no matter how small in the work of his kingdom.

The faithful mustard seed of God's reign grows through us in our workplace, family, school, community, church, and society. We may not see it. We may not think we're making a major impact. But God is at work in and through us, extending his kingdom of the heavens in a broken, lonely world.

What I'm reminded of in this parable, is that the kingdom of heaven is already here. We are not gatekeepers; we are the welcome wagon to the kingdom of heaven!

God's kingdom transcends, it is both earthly and heavenly, and it bridges the two. The kingdom of heaven is both caught up in our ordinary lives and beyond our understanding. You see this in Matthew 13:31-32, which compares the smallest everyday miracles from mustard seeds to the labors of ordinary people.

We may be only one, we cannot do everything, but God gives us grace to do something in the kingdom of heaven!

Thank you to everyone who donated to the Book Drive. This year, we collected 336 books.


Books were distributed to children participating in the summer lunch programs at local churches as well as our own daycare children. Over 100+ children in the community were impacted.

1973: Year That Changed the World ... From AARP Hip-hop is 50; NASCAR is 75; Jeff Bridges is still a superstar.

Fifty years ago, Americans were worried about rising prices and a looming recession (sound familiar?). In 1973 inflation more than doubled, from 3.7 percent to 8.7 percent, and effectively ended the post-World War II economic boom. But everything is relative. You could afford to take the long way ... gas was 39 cents a gallon, eggs were 78 cents a dozen, and you could get 10 pounds of potatoes for less than a buck. A first-class postage stamp cost 8 cents. When compared to today, this doesn't sound too bad. But, the minimum wage was \$1.60/hour and the median family income was \$12,050.00.

Young Americans were ready for something new. On August 11, 1973, at a rec room party in an apartment complex in the Bronx, a couple of teenagers changed the world. A young DJ added a second turntable to extend the most danceable instrumental breaks in the music, set up the microphone, and a new culture was born. His name was Clive Campbell ... Later known as DJ Kool Herc, the father of hip-hop. Today, hip-hop is a global phenomenon with a style of its own.

That same year, in the south, NASCAR (which began in 1948) began to slowly break out of the Southeast to become a popular sport across the country in the early 70's. This brings us to Jeff Bridges, and the 1973 film, *The Last American Hero*, a movie about the Southern stock car culture. Dale Earnhardt Jr. called it the best of the NASCAR movies.

The main character was Junior Jackson, who was based on real-life racing legend Junior Johnson. He honed his driving skills outrunning revenuers on backwoods North Carolina roads. The story was written by Tom Wolfe, author and journalist, who saw the trend and popularity of the Southern car world. Johnson was a "modern hero", that people could identify with.

Southern stock car racing culture, like hip-hop, grew organically from a regional thing, until it ranked right up there with the NFL and the NBA in terms of popularity. 1973 was a remarkable year.



AUGUST WEATHER LORE

If the first week in August is unusually warm, the coming winter will be snowy and long.

If a cold August follows a hot July, it foretells a winter hard and dry.

"For every fog in August, there will be a snowfall in winter."

While many of us in the 21st century may think weather lore is more whimsical than wise, it's hard to discount all of these "natural forecasters," especially when they prove to be true. But how could a saying that's been passed down from sailor to farmer to business executive really predict the weather?!

While not all weather lore is accurate, there are many sayings that prove to be on the mark time and time again. When you examine weather folklore, you realize that the basics of this weather predicting method are careful observations that have been made over many years. Weather lore relies on the notion that there is a strong cause-and-effect relationship between nature and the weather.

A weather lore forecaster takes cues from nature at the time he or she needs to know what the weather is going to be like. It is more of a short-term forecast for a specific area, rather than a long -term forecast for broad areas.

Flowers that have a second bloom in the fall or hold onto their blooms late in the season forecast a colder winter.

Leaves which fall early indicate winter will be mild. When leaves fall late, winter will be wild. If the leaves wither on the branches in October instead of falling, an extra cold winter is in store.

Apple skins which are tougher and thicker also tell us a colder winter is expected.

Corn husks which are thicker and tighter than usual indicate a cold winter ahead.

Squirrels with very bushy tails in the fall cue a colder winter. If squirrels stash their nuts high in the trees, the snow will be deep.

Birds that migrate early are a cue to severe winter.

When wild turkeys perch in trees and refuse to come down, snow is imminent. If turkey feathers are unusually thick, look for a hard winter.

One final FYI ... The date of the first snowflakes tells how many times it will snow. Should the year's first snow, for example, come down on the 12th of the month, you can expect 12 more storms before the winter's done.
